COURSE PURPOSE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The purpose of this course is to introduce you to the major communication theories and their histories that are the foundation to understanding the discipline of communication. These theories can be applied to interpersonal, group, organizational, intercultural, and mass communication contexts. You will be expected to understand the key concepts of each theory and be able to apply them to everyday life situations, events, and/or communication artifacts.

At the completion of this course, you should be able to:

- identify, explain, and compare theoretical concepts (exams)
- apply theories to real-life situations and artifacts (journal & final paper)
- critique theories with class members (class activities & discussion)
- understand, explain, apply, and present one theory in depth (final paper)

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Grading. Your final grade will be determined based on your performance on the following:

Self-Introduction Exercise (15 points). Each student will be responsible for participating in both posting and commenting on the self-introduction exercise by

Theory Journals (60 points). On 4 class periods you will apply two concepts from a communication theory (redefined in your own words) to real life situations. You can also relate the concepts to a current event. The 1st journal from every student will be on Chapter 8 / Social Penetration Theory. Each student will be given a schedule of his/her subsequent journals. Subsequent journals must be Posted to your Group's correct Weekly Discussion Page online on the day they are due. Each journal should be roughly 1-2 typed. These journals will provide a jumping off point for class discussions. No late journals will be accepted. Four journals @15 points, 60 total. See the assignment sheet and grading rubrics on Canvas for specific instructions.

Discussion Participation (120 points). Each week, students will be expected to provide at least two substantive responses to their group's appropriate weekly discussion pages. Guidelines for substantive responses and more specific requirements can be found on Canvas. Twelve weeks @ 10 points/week, 120 total.

- Exams (3 @ 100 points). There will be three multiple choice & essay type exams that focus on application of course material. Each exam is worth 100 points for a total of 300 points possible. Exams will be done in Chi Tester and will have a time limit. Tests must be completed and submitted by the due date. Exams cannot be made up unless there is a medical or school excuse and I have **prior** notification. More detailed information will be given on Canvas.
- Analysis of Past Theory Paper (50 points). In a three-four page paper you will analyze the components of a past Comm 3000 final paper posted on Canvas by using the grading rubric for our class's final paper.
- Paper proposal (30 points). Submit a paper proposal for your final paper that identifies the theory you plan to use, the communication artifact/situation you plan to apply it to, how you will apply it (basic methods discussion), and your initial reference list.
- Paper workshop (15 points). During the 14th week of class, students will be required to participate in a 15 minute meeting with me via phone, Skype, or in-person meetings to discuss their progress on their individual final paper project. Participation in the meeting (including evidence one is prepared for the meeting by having read & revised the paper proposal based on instructor feedback) will be counted towards this score.
- Final Paper (125 points). The final paper is a significant, in-depth application of a theory to a communication event or artifact of your choice (minimum 10 pages). The paper will include an in-depth explanation of the theory, a literature review, and application of the theory to a communication event. [Note: You will want to save your completed paper to help prepare your portfolio for graduation.] You must turn in the final project to complete the course. See the assignment sheet and grading rubrics on Canvas for specific instructions.
